Are you right-handed or left-handed? If you're a righty, you're in the majority, but if you're a lefty, you're in good company. Paul McCartney, Angelina Jolie, and Prince William have all been seen signing autographs with their left hands. In addition, several recent U.S. Presidents—including Barack Obama, Bill Clinton, George H.W. Bush, and Gerald Ford—were left-handed. One more, Ronald Reagan, was left-handed at birth but learned to write with his right hand, as many lefties are encouraged to do. Scientists estimate that only 10% of the world's population is naturally left-handed. Some studies suggest that left-handedness may be associated with greater creativity and divergent thinking, which might explain the high proportion of lefties among artists, musicians, and other creative professionals. Left-handedness appears to run in families, too. Now, if you're ambidextrous, meaning you're equally adept in the use of both left and right hands and feet, you're even more rare. They say that only one out of one hundred people are naturally ambidextrous. Being able to use both hands equally well can be advantageous, especially for athletes, artists and musicians. It may come as no surprise, then, to learn that Leonardo da Vinci was ambidextrous.
