Susan's Diary

★Sunday, Aug. 31st (10:05 p.m.)

I visited Yuko today. She's from Nagoya originally, but she moved to Iwakura years ago when she got married. She loves living there, and she **proudly** told me all about her city. It is the smallest city in Aichi Prefecture and the 10th smallest city in Japan, but there are three ruins — Iwakura Castle, Inoue Castle, and Yatsurugi Fort — in this small city. This is because Iwakura was one of the centers of the Owari region during the Sengoku period (period of warring states in Japan). Iwakura Castle was the **headquarters** of the Oda family in Iwakura, who divided the Owari region into north and south. Therefore, Iwakura Castle was the front line of defense against the surrounding forces. Inoue Castle and the Yatsurugi Fort were intended to protect Iwakura Castle, but Iwakura Castle was destroyed by Oda Nobunaga in 1559. After that, Iwakura **flourished** as a castle town, and that's why many temples and shrines remain in the area today. In fact, there are 25 shrines and 32 temples in Iwakura. There are so many temples in such a small city because the warlords of the Sengoku period used this area as their base of operations, and they built temples and shrines to serve as their family temples and prayer halls. In the Edo period (1603-1867), Iwakura-kaido, the road connecting Nagoya and Inuyama, was built, and Iwakura prospered as an important transportation center. Iwakura was a very important town at that time, so Iwakura made three festival floats 400 years ago. Every spring, they are on parade during the cherry blossom festival, and in summer, they are on parade with lanterns and karakuri dolls (Japanese traditional mechanical dolls). The Shimohonmachi float is the largest in Aichi Prefecture. Yuko told me that she had a chance to see that float this August. The way she described it made me want to see it myself. I hope I can go there with her next time!

There are several complex explanations for why humans lie, but a group of researchers recently found that our chosen method of communication may also influence how often we alter the truth. A notable study revealed that people fib about 25-50 percent more frequently via e-mail than they do in handwritten letters. According to scientists, this increased dishonesty stems from the greater psychological "distance" that users perceive in digital environments and the fact that most people feel less inhibited when communicating online. This detachment can make it easier to bend the truth without feeling the same level of guilt or social pressure. Although it was already well established that people are more likely to fib when sending text messages than when speaking on the phone or in person, researchers conducting the study were surprised to find a similarly significant discrepancy between relatively two comparable written mediums: e-mail and traditional letters.
